Girl aims to help SPCA at Luxton Hall craft fair

When 10-year-old Carlena Dowden met BJ - a cocker spaniel with glaucoma - at the SPCA, she couldn't get the dog out of her mind.

Instead of feeling sorry for the pooch, she decided to convert her feelings into action.

After spending many holidays making

crafts with her mother and grandmother, Dowden felt she had a marketable skill.

Armed with scissors, a hot glue gun and the hopes of helping BJ, the Victoria stu-dent embarked on a craftmaking frenzy. She wanted to raise enough money to pay 'It's sad that

with school, Girl Guides, gymnastics and swimming lessons, Dowden found time to warm, cozy make hundreds of Christmas home... ornaments and decorations.

Every weekend for a month leading up to Christmas Dowden sold her wares at craft fairs around the city.

"I just drove her to the craft fairs and helped her set up," her mother Anne-Marga-ret said. "This was all entirely her will."

A poster board with BJ's photo hung behind her table as Dowden enthusiastically explained her mission to every curious shopper.

After paying her mother back for supplies, Dowden earned \$1,500.

Anne-Margaret said she asked her daugh-ter if she wanted to buy herself anything with part of the earnings. Carlena said her bicycle was too small, but she didn't want to compromise BJ's surgery by spending any of the profits.

Although Dowden forfeited her own desires for an animal in need at the time,

Dowden said when she went to visit BJ after the surgery, the dog rested his head on her lap and didn't want to leave her side.

Dowden is back working the craft fair circuit this holiday season, hoping to raise \$2,000 this year for the SPCA.

"It's sad that the animals can't be in a warm, cozy home," she said.

While Dowden said she doesn't want to be a veteri-narian anymore, claiming it's a "phase" most kids go through, her compassion for animals has not diminished.

"Animals can't speak for themselves. I want to be their voice," she said.

Dowden will being selling

her Christmas decorations this weekend at the Luxton Hall, 1040 Marwood Rd. in Langford.

Thirty tables are expected to be set up for the Dec. 10-11 event.

Event organizer Coleen Minnow said admission is free. However she encourages shoppers to bring donations for the West Shore community food bank.

Minnow, like Dowden, hopes to raise funds to make living with disease a little easier. However, it's not a dog she is raising funds for and it's not an illness that surgery can fix. Minnow, 32, has fibromyalgia and has not worked for three years.

"I'm not embarrassed and I don't want pity," she said. "People in craft shows are

enterprising. We take pride in our work."

Minnow is more excited about taking a truckload of food to the food bank after the craft fair than she is about earning enough money make her rent next month.
